Impetigo fact sheet

Control guidelines

Impetigo is a highly contagious bacterial infection of the skin. Good hygiene helps prevent spread of infection. If antibiotics are given it is important to finish the whole course to make sure the impetigo will not recur.

What is impetigo?

Impetigo is a bacterial skin infection caused by Streptococcus and Staphylococcus bacteria. It is commonly known as 'school sores' because a majority of cases are in school-aged children. However, it can also affect infants, adults and adolescents.

What does it look like?

Impetigo occurs in two forms, blistering and crusted. In blistering impetigo the blisters arise on previously normal skin, and rapidly grow in size and number. The blisters quickly burst and leave slightly moist or glazed areas with a brown crust at the edge. The spots expand even after they break open and can be many centimetres wide. They sometimes clear in the centre to produce ring shaped patterns. They are not usually painful, but can be itchy.

Crusted impetigo has a thick soft yellow crust. Beneath this crust is a moist red area. Crusted impetigo spots grow slowly and are always smaller than the fully developed spots of blistering impetigo. They are not usually painful, but can be itchy.

How is it treated?

Depending on how bad the infection is, your doctor may recommend the use of an antibiotic ointment or oral antibiotics in severe cases. Antibiotic ointment should be continued until the sores have completely healed. If oral antibiotics are given it is important to finish the whole course of treatment (usually 5 days) and not stop when the impetigo starts to clear.

Sores should be cleaned every 8-12 hours, dried thoroughly and covered with a waterproof dressing. Bathing the blisters with salty water will help to dry them out (use saline solution or dissolve about half a teaspoon of salt in a cup of water).

How is it spread?

Impetigo is very easy to catch from other people. Impetigo is usually spread through direct contact with other infected people. How can you avoid spreading the infection?

While you have the infection:

Sores should be kept clean and covered with a waterproof dressing to prevent them being touched or scratched.

Children with impetigo should be kept home from school or other group settings if their wounds cannot be kept covered until 24 hours after antibiotic treatment has been started, or until the blisters have dried out if antibiotics are not used.

To prevent impetigo children should be taught:

To wash their hands often with soap. Resources on handwashing can be found in the 5th Edition of Staying Healthy: Preventing infectious diseases in early childhood education and care services.

Not to scratch scabs or pick their nose.

In addition to general hygiene measures, specific measures to prevent spread in schools and childcare include:

Teachers, children and families should understand the importance of hand washing, covering sores and staying home if sick

Impetigo is dangerous for babies

It is important for people with impetigo to keep away from newborns and young babies. Newborn babies are particularly susceptible to impetigo because their immune systems are not fully developed.

Regular use of sunscreen has been shown to reduce the incidence of melanoma and squamous cell carcinoma, both in the short and long term.

What does sunscreen do?

Sunscreen protects against the damaging effects of the sun by reducing or filtering the amount of ultraviolet (UV) rays that reach the skin.

What is the most effective way to use sunscreen?

- Use at least SPF 30+ broad spectrum water-resistant sunscreen.
- Patch test sunscreen on a small area of skin especially if you have not used the product before.
- Apply and re-apply. Apply sunscreen 20 minutes before going outside and re-apply every two hours.
- Apply generously. Dosage will vary depending on the size of the child. However on an average size child, it is recommended to apply ½ a teaspoon of sunscreen to each arm, leg, front of body, back of the body and the face (including ears and neck).
- Remember sunscreen filters out most but not all UV radiation.
 Use sunscreen in combination with other sun protection methods, including broad brimmed, bucket or legionnaire style hats, sun safe clothing and staying in the shade. Sunglasses are recommended to protect children's eyes.

Helping Your Child to Read



Making the connection between sounds and letters

Many of the activities outlined in the Early Reading Experiences section can be slightly changed to suit older children.

Rhymes

You can reinforce your older child's knowledge of the sounds in words by helping them to make up rhymes and songs. Base them on their interests, their favourite television character, game, sport or pet or start a 'thyme rap' with words and phrases like 'see ya later/alligator', 'unreal/banana peel', 'in a while/crocodile', 'ah oh/spaghetti-oh', 'all right/vegemite', or 'far out/brussel sprout'. Rap music is based on reciting rhyming words in a musical style and is a great way for older children to enjoy learning about sounds.

You can use rhymes every day by asking your child to find a rhyme for hat (mat), chair (hair) or other common objects.

Problem words

Listen to your child read every day, ideally for 15 to 20 minutes. When they encounter a problem word, prompt them to work it out by using any or all of the following techniques. Ask them to:

- · sound it out
- · identify the first sound
- identify any of the sounds
- · find any little words inside the big one
- read on to the end of the sentence and think what word would make sense
- · check for clues in the pictures
- · find a word that looks like it
- change some of the letters to make a word they know
- re-read the sentence
- think again about what word would make sense. Try the word in the sentence. Re-read the sentence.

Online games

There are many online games that are designed to help your child build reading skills, such as those found at www.starfall.com or



Online games and stories can help your child to build their reading skills.

Silent guided reading

For this technique you and your child need a copy of the same piece of text – this could be a book or an article. You and your child agree to read to a certain point: to the end of a sentence, two sentences, a paragraph or a page. Once you have both read silently to that point you discuss what you have read. Ask your child to identify words that they found difficult. You might write these words with their meaning and hints for pronunciation in a special book. Talk about the meaning of words, how you worked out what different words meant and what the main idea was in what you read.

Building your child's vocabulary

Reading to your child at a level higher than they can read helps build their vocabulary and confidence with books.

Reading together

Read a book that interests your child. Stop and talk about a few of the words and phrases used. Ask your child comprehension questions about what you have read, such as: 'What was the best part?', 'How do you think the characters will manage this crisis?', 'What do you think will happen next?'. Make the questions enjoyable and part of a conversation rather than a test.

Flash cards

If your child is interested, you can make flash cards. Your child's teacher can help you identify some high-frequency words that would be useful for your child in their reading development. Use lots of positive reinforcement each time they get a new word correct.

Flash cards help children to memorise words.



Pause, prompt and praise

Listen to your child read and when they get to a word they do not understand or use wrongly, help them learn some self-help strategies

- Pause to give your child a chance to think and solve the problem themselves.
- Prompt with clues about meaning or pronunciation, depending on what is needed. If your child doesn't respond to the clues, prompt by asking them to read on to the end of the sentence and then go back to the word or go back to the beginning. If the word is not correct after two prompts say, 'The word is ...'.
- Praise when your child reads a sentence correctly, when your child self-corrects, when your child gets a word correct after prompting, when your child has a good try at self-correction, when your child has a good try after a prompt.

Building your child's fluency

To improve your child's reading fluency, read to your child as they follow the words. You can run your finger underneath the words so that your child gains understanding of how fluent reading occurs. Children also need a good bank of sight words that occur regularly in reading.

The 'whole word, whole sentence' approach

The whole word, whole sentence approach to developing fluency is a technique that parents can use at home with their child.

To use this method, sit next to your child and tell them you are going to read out loud together. Share a copy of a book that is not too difficult for your child to read. You can use a flction or non-fiction book.




